

The Massie Bridge



Members of the Massie community gathered on the bridge early one morning a few days before the demolition mid-July 2024.

Sadly, our beloved centenarian bridge has been demolished to be replaced by a shiny new one that will be 10 feet wider.

A group of us gathered on the bridge the Friday morning before the demolition. Connie Miller came with her drone to record us



for posterity – https://youtu.be/q9eilgQqpCk?si=mHgtprM1c tc-Fo1P. The bridge was festooned with flowers as it has been every year for over a decade now.

Unfortunately, some of the nearby residents were away or at work and couldn't be in the photo. Peter Turk was also there taking photographs and plans to document the whole process from demolition to construction of the new bridge.

What little evidence we have points to 1913 as the year the bridge was likely built. According to a reference in the November 4,


1912 session of Council in the Holland Township Minute Book, 1912-1928, held at the Grey County Archives, cement was to be ordered for two bridges, one at Massie.

Dr. Gilbert Howey 1933 - 2024



The community of Massie was saddened to hear of the passing of Gilbert Howey this spring. A psychiatrist by profession who worked both in Toronto and Owen Sound, Gilbert will be best remembered for his beautiful singing.

The whole family enjoyed music when Gilbert and his sisters Florence and Jean were growing up on the family farm on Grey Road 40, but he was the only one who became a public performer, joining the Mendelssohn Choir in Toronto. He began singing at the tender age of 3, entertaining folks at umpteen weddings, funerals, garden parties and other events even as a child. And, of course, he sang throughout his life at the Massie United Church.

Gilbert is survived by his family: his oldest son Ian and his wife Susan Tingley and their children Kate and Jonathan, his second son Kevin and his wife Adrienne Galway and their children Shannon Rose and Angelina, and his daughter Heather Rayne and her husband Vlad Orovic, as well as his sisters Florence Smith and Jean Perdue and their families. He is dearly missed by all.

A Run in Memory of Emilie Sauks

It is hard to believe that Emilie died of colon cancer already a year ago in July 2023. Every day we have missed her smile, laugh, and witty remarks. It has been hard not being able to pick up the phone and call her just to say hello, to share what's up, to get her advice. Emilie had a kind and brilliant mind and, while she was a private person, you were guaranteed to have interesting conversations and to benefit from her perspective. She truly wanted the best for everyone.

Emile was a beautiful piano player. She was creative and made her daughter's diapers from old T-shirts, felted purses and knitted clothing. She loved to run. She was a talented runner in high school and continued to enjoy challenging herself physically right up to when she suddenly got very sick from the cancer and could no longer run.

Throughout her illness, Emilie comported herself with a strength and grace that no one could have reasonably expected of her. She worried mostly about her children and Jody, and not seeing her young nieces and nephew grow up. She continued to walk outside, even when it was hard.

Emilie moved from Toronto to Massie in 1995 with her parents Jo Ann and Toomas, and her sisters Kate

and Jenn, after the family bought their farm on Concession 6S. Despite already being in high school when she moved, and only a few short years later moving to London to attend Western University, it was Massie that Emilie considered home.

After completing her undergraduate degree in geography, Emilie enrolled in the Center of Geographic Sciences in Nova Scotia to earn a diploma in marine geomatics. It was there that she met her future partner, Jody, and set off an exciting career of travelling the 519-377-8722 world surveying coastlines. Some of her most notable work locations were Alaska, Guam, northern Australia, the Marshall Islands, and American Samoa. Her home base then was Mississippi. It wasn't long in her tenure before Hurricane Katrina devastated the gulf communities along Louisiana and Mississippi. Emilie's car was flooded with salt water, her apartment

building reduced to rubble in a parking lot. For a while she stayed in the community – in an RV in a community called Kiln (which the locals called Kill). Her temporary accommodations left much to be desired, and were situated near a pond with a few alligators. Eventually she transferred away from the Mississippi office to San Diego. The new position allowed her to live in Canada, so she moved to Victoria, BC to be with Jody again.

Emilie and Jody lived in Thunder Bay and then Edmonton before returning to Massie to start their family. Emilie was mother to two wonderful children, Thomas and Kylie, whom she loved dearly. She taught them to be kind to others and themselves, and to always try their best. She particularly loved spending time outdoors with them, whether on her parents' farm, the Bruce Trail, or camping.

In the spirit of Emilie's love of running, in the autumn of 2023 Emilie's family set up a charity run to raise money for colon cancer research through the Canadian Cancer Society. This November will be the second iteration of that run. Please consider supporting this cause. Cancer medicine has made truly remarkable advancements in recent years, but much work and research remains to be done. Run or walk 7km in November and share your efforts on social media with the hashtag #Emilies7k.
